1. Call to Order

Invocation/Pledge of Allegiance

Mayor Liles called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m. Commissioner Hagans offered the Prayer and Commissioner Taylor led the Pledge.

2. Roll Call - Cathy Webb

Members present were: Mayor Liles, Commissioners Hagans, Shackleford, Taylor, Washington and Wilkes. A quorum was declared.

3. Consider Agenda Approval – Motion made by Commissioner Hagans, seconded by Commissioner Shackleford. Motion carried.

4. Consider Minutes Approval – December 13, 2015

Motion made by Commissioner Washington, seconded by Commissioner Shackleford to approve the December 13, 2015 minutes as presented. Motion carried.

5. Program/Presentations-

FYE 2015 Audit Report - Andrew Harris, CPA

Mr. Harris said that the Town received an unqualified opinion in an audit of its 2014-2015 fiscal year. He said that the unqualified opinion is the highest form of assurance that you can receive on a set of audit and financial statements. He said that he found the Town to be in good financial standing. Mr. Harris highlighted several parts of the audit, including the Town's assets and the tax collection rate which was 97.5%, which is higher than the state average. (A copy of the audit is available for viewing at the Town Office)

6. Report of Officers –

a. Mayor – Mayor Liles thanked Mr. Hill and Mrs. Webb for their services to the Town in having such a good audit.

b. Town Manager/PW Director

1) Pending Special Use Permit – Mr. Hill stated that the Planning Board would meet on January 12th at 7:00 p.m. to hear a special use request from Carolina Poultry, an Energy Production Facility, that will be located behind Yamco. The Planning Board will then send a written recommendation to the Board of Adjustments and that Board will meet on January 28th at 7:00 p.m.

- 2) Gym Acquisition Mr. Hill has given the County Manager all the Information that the County Board requested from the Town. He thinks they have all the information that they need and will consider passing the Property to the Town.
- 3) ETJ Boundaries Mr. Hill said that the ETJ Boundaries need to be cleaned up to take the boundaries out to a physical mark. A Public Hearing will need to be held. The Board consented to having the hearing at the March 14th meeting.
- **4) Patrol Vehicles** The Town Manager asked for permission to negotiate Patrol Car Sale/Acquisition at a cost not to exceed \$30,000.

Upon receipt of your answers to the following comments, we will be able to complete production of your new code. The contractual review period (during which the town is to review the preliminary manuscript and respond to this report) is 90 DAYS following the receipt of this report, YOUR RESPONSES WILL BE DUE BY JANUARY 22. Please feel free to make changes and suggestions to the preliminary manuscript in addition to those discussed in the following comments. Upon receipt of your responses, we will finish and ship the first edition of the code to you within ten to twelve weeks. If you will need to extend this review period, please let us know.

Please remember that the "preliminary" manuscript is for review purposes only. An index and parallel reference tables, which will indicate the location of each state statute, resolution, and ordinance within the code, will be inserted in the final version of the code. The final code will also contain tab dividers before each title, the index, and the parallel reference tables and will be printed on white paper.

General Comments

1) We have organized the new code into the following titles with chapters, subchapters, and sections:

- Definitions and rules of construction contained in Title I will not be repeated throughout the code unless a variation of the definition or rule applies to a particular code provision.
- 3) Severability provisions throughout the code have been eliminated, as they are covered by the severability provisions of § 10.07.
- 4) A simplified penalty reference ("Penalty, see § . . .") has been placed in a separate line at the end of the text of each section, where appropriate.

- 5) As histories for the code sections, we have listed the specific number and passage date of the original ordinance and amending ordinances, if any. Example: (Ord. 19, passed 1-1-1960; Ord. 20, passed 1-1-1070; Ord. 30, passed 1-1-1980).
- A "G.S." cite included in the history indicates that the text of the section reads either verbatim or substantially the same as the statute. Example: (G.S. § 160A.11) (Ord. 10, passed 1-17-80; Ord. 20, passed 1-1-1985). A "G.S." cite set forth as a "statutory reference" following the text of the section indicates that the reader should refer to that statute for further information. Example:

§ 39.01 PUBLIC RECORDS AVAILABLE.

This municipality shall make available to any person for inspection or copying all public records, unless otherwise exempted by state law.

Statutory reference:

Inspection of public records, see G.S. §§ 132-1 et seq.

- Note that the titles in your new code are separately paginated, for ease of supplementation. If, for example, the town adds material to Title III during a supplement, then the page numbers in Title III will shift accordingly. The page numbers in the remaining titles (V through XV) will not shift, because they have self-contained pagination. Because the town will pay a charge per changed page in supplementation, this style of pagination will actually save the town money. If someone is concerned about ability to locate material quickly, please remember that the final product will have tabbed dividers before each title, clearly marked with the name of that title.
- 8) In order to complete your new code, we need you to return to us the below-listed items, all in one packet if possible:
 - a) Your responses to this report. We recommend that you simply write your responses directly on this report. Or, you may return your responses on a separate sheet of paper, or mark them on your blue manuscript and return it to us.
 - b) A copy of each new ordinance passed since you received your draft manuscript, and any ordinances not included in your draft manuscript which you wish to add to your code.
 - Other changes you wish to make, if any. We suggest that you mark such changes directly on your blue draft manuscript, and return it to us. Please note that we will retain the returned manuscript, so you may want to make a copy of the affected pages for your records.
- 9) Many municipalities insert prior to the actual code sections a page acknowledging the current officials of the municipality. If you desire such an acknowledgment, the responses to this report should include a current list of the any officials the town wants to include. Should such an acknowledgment page be added to the code? If so, please provide a list of Town Officials.
- 10) Your codification contract base price is \$9,600, based upon an estimated 450 pages. Your draft manuscript is currently 324 pages. We anticipate that the index should add an additional 32 pages. TITLE I: GENERAL PROVISIONS

- 17) Chapter 10: General Provisions.
 - a) The purpose of this chapter is to reduce duplication and create consistency throughout the code. To this end, we have replaced obsolete and repetitive ordinance sections with comprehensive, general code provisions, most of which are self-explanatory in nature and need no particular comment; however, we ask that you review the chapter and advise if anything is unclear or unsatisfactory.
 - b) Please note that we used model provisions from another North Carolina client in creating this chapter. Is this chapter acceptable as currently edited?
- 18) § 10.99 General Penalty. The penalty in this section references G.S. § 14-4 as authority for the \$50/30 days penalty, however, please note that G.S. § 14-4 only sets out the maximum fine; it does not mention imprisonment. G.S. § 160A-175 specifically authorizes imprisonment for ordinance violations, so the penalty imposed in this section is clearly authorized under that statute. Unless otherwise instructed, we will retain this section as presently edited.

- 19) § 31.10 Building Inspector. We deleted the cross-reference that reads: "Building Inspector to serve as Flood Control Administrator, see §§ 151.20 and 151.21," because the town's newest version of the Floodplain Ordinance appoints the Town Administrator as Floodplain Administrator. Was this editorial decision correct?
- 20) § 31.12 Superintendent of Cemeteries. This section references G.S. § 160A-349, which is an incorrect citation. We believe the correct reference is G.S. § 160A-348. Shall we correct this citation?
- \$\\$\ 31.25\$ through \$31.31: Employment Policies. These sections were originally in Prior Code Ch. 34, and were amended by Resolution 2014-2, however, because of conflicting section titles, it was unclear whether Res. 2014-2 amended all of \\$\\$\ 31.25\$ through \$31.31, or only the sections listed in the resolution. Should these sections be replaced with the amendments in Res. 2014-2, or should only those sections listed in Res. 2014-2 be amended?
- 22) § 31.26 Holidays. Division (A)(6) reads: "Thanksgiving Day and Friday (Veterans Day)." Should this read "Thanksgiving Day and the Friday after," with a new entry for Veterans Day?
- \$ 32.02 County Board of Elections to Conduct Town Elections. This section references G.S. § 163-285, which has been repealed. G.S. § 163-284 pertains to administration by the County Board of Elections. We suggest replacing G.S. § 163-285 with G.S. § 163-284. Shall we make this change?
- 24) Ch. 34 Civil Emergencies. The statutory reference for this chapter cites G.S. §§ 14-288.12, which has been repealed. Shall we delete this reference?

25) § 35.01 Purchasing Procedures. Division (B) refers to the Treasurer-Clerk and it is unclear whether the town has this position. Should this read "Treasurer-Clerk" or "Clerk"?

TITLE V: PUBLIC WORKS

- 26) Ord. passed 3-8-2004 amended the town's Water, Sewer and Garbage Billing Policies Book, which we did not receive. For this reason, this amending ordinance was not included in the draft. Was this editorial decision correct?
- 27) Resolution 2014-2 amended Prior Code's §§ 50.55, 50.58, 50.59, and 59.60, however, these sections did not exist after Chapter 50 was replaced with Ord. passed 9-10-2001. Should these provisions be included in Title V?
- 28) Ch. 50 Garbage and Trash. The statutory reference located after the chapter analysis is to G.S. § 160A-192, which has been repealed. G.S. § 160A-312 gives municiaplies authority to regulate solid waste disposal, therefore we suggest revising the statutory reference to read: "Authority to regulate solid waste collection and disposal systems and facilities, see G.S. § 160A-312." Shall we make this change?
- 29) § 51.037 Delinquent Accounts. This section provides for the termination of water service for nonpayment of a bill. Please note that the U.S. Supreme Court case of Memphis Light, Gas, and Water Division v. Craft, 436 U.S. 1 (1978), held that a municipality may not terminate utility service without giving the customer a fair opportunity to avoid termination either by paying the bill or questioning its accuracy. The customer must be notified not only of the possibility of termination but also of a procedure for challenging a disputed bill. This section does not meet these standards because it is unclear whether there is notice sent to the customer and there is no mention of procedures in place for the customer to challenge or appeal.

Enclosed with this report is a model provision designed to comply with federal standards. We suggest incorporation of the model material into either your code (by adding it as part of this section), or into the policies used by the Board for disconnection. If you would like to add the enclosed model to your code, please specify where you wish it to be added. Unless otherwise instructed, we will retain this section as presently edited.

- 30) § 51.066 Compliance with Federal and State Law. This section references several federal and state laws. To assist users in locating these acts, we suggest inserting the corresponding citations, to read: "...the Federal Safe Drinking Water Act, being 42 U.S.C. §§ 300f et seq., the North Carolina Drinking Water Act, being G.S. §§ 130A-311 et seq. and the State Building Code, being G.S. § 143-138..." - 31) § 52.05 Excluded Wastes. Division (A)(3) contains the phrase "...at temperatures between 0° and 65°..." Are these temperatures Fahrenheit or Celsius?

32) § 70.99 Penalty. Please note that we used a model provision from another North Carolina client in creating this penalty section. Is this section acceptable as currently edited?

If this is the case, then an Editor's Note can be added to explain that § 90.02 supercedes any conflicting regulations adopted in § 90.01. Shall we add an Editor's Note? Unless otherwise instructed, we will retain these sections as presently edited.
- 34) Ch. 91 Cemeteries. We received a one page document that we were unsure whether or not to include in this chapter. It wasn't set up like an ordinance but is policy about veteran supplemental burial benefits. Would you like this policy to be included in Ch. 91? If so, please provide an ordinance number, if available, in order for us to track the ordinance number and history.
- 35) Ch. 91 Cemeteries. There was a handwritten note on the Prior Code which read: "vault or grave liner required." If you wish to have something additional included in this chapter, please specify how you want it to read.
- 36) Ch. 92 Fire Protection and Prevention. There was a handwritten note on the Prior Code which read: "Dana do not issue permits because it is picked up by town. 9-6-11." If you wish to have something additional included in this chapter, please specify how you want it to read.
- 37) § 93.01 Nuisances Declared. The ordinance in this section contained a handwritten note referring to division (A), in which "24" was crossed out and "12" was written in. Shall we make this change?
- 38) § 93.43 Right to Probable Cause Hearing Before Sale or Final Disposition of Vehicle. This section references G.S. § 20-222, which has been repealed. G.S. § 20-219.11 pertains to notice and probable cause hearing for a towed vehicle. We suggest replacing the repealed citation with G.S. § 20-219.11. Shall we make this change?

TITLE XI: BUSINESS REGULATIONS

- 39) Ch. 110 General Provisions. The statutory reference located after the chapter analysis is to G.S. § 160A-211, which has been repealed effective July 1, 2015. We suggest deleting this statutory reference. Shall we make this change?
- 40) § 113.01 Definition. The definition of Taxicab references G.S. §§ 63-3(17) and 63-3(18), which are incorrect references. We believe the correct references are G.S. §§ 62-3(17) and 62-3(18). Shall we correct these references?

UTILITY DISCONNECTION SAMPLE (See comment #29)

§ XX.XX DISCONNECTION FOR LATE PAYMENT.

- (A) It is the policy of the town to discontinue utility service to customers by reason of nonpayment of bills only after notice and a meaningful opportunity to be heard on disputed bills. The town's form for application for utility service and all bills shall contain, in addition to the title, address, room number, and telephone number of the official in charge of billing, clearly visible and easily readable provisions to the effect:
 - (1) That all bills are due and payable on or before the date set forth on the bill; and
- (2) That if any bill is not paid by or before that date, a second bill will be mailed containing a cutoff notice that if the bill is not paid within ten days of the mailing of the second bill, service will be discontinued for nonpayment; and
- (3) That any customer disputing the correctness of his bill shall have a right to a hearing at which time he may be represented in person and by counsel or any other person of his choosing and may present orally or in writing his complaint and contentions to the town official in charge of utility billing. This official shall be authorized to order that the customer's service not be discontinued and shall have the authority to make a final determination of the customer's complaint.
- (B) Requests for delays or waiver of payment will not be entertained; only questions of proper and correct billing will be considered. In the absence of payment of the bill rendered or resort to the hearing procedure provided herein, service will be discontinued at the time specified, but in no event until the charges have been due and unpaid for at least 30 days.
- (C) When it becomes necessary for the town to discontinue utility service to a customer for nonpayment of bills, service will be reinstated only after all bills for service then due have been paid, along with a turn-on charge in the sum of \$20.

Recodification of Town Code of Ordinances

I have reviewed the draft revisions of the Town Code of Ordinances and offer the following comments and suggestions. Should you have any questions regarding the same, please do not hesitate to contact me.

- 1. Charter §4-3: This was an inadvertent exclusion in the form of government change process. The following section should be added and can be done so through this recodification process through the authority granted in N.C. Gen. Stat. 160A-496:
 - 4-3: The board of commissioners shall appoint a town attorney who shall be licensed to engage in the practice of law in the State of North Carolina. It shall be the duty of the town attorney to prosecute and defend suits against the town; to advise the mayor, board of commissioners and other town officials with respect to the affairs of the town; to draft all legal documents relating to the affairs of the town; to inspect and pass upon all agreements, contracts, franchises, and other instruments with which the town may be concerned; to attend meetings of the board of commissioners; and to perform other duties required by law or as the board of commissioners may direct.
- 2. §35.02: N.C. Gen. Stat. 160A-266(c) permits municipal governing boards to delegate disposal authority of personal property valued at less than \$30,000 to any municipal official. The current version of the Town's ordinance gives this authority to the Mayor, but limits the authority to items valued at less than \$500. The Town could amend this ordinance to increase the dollar amount and/or designate an official other than the mayor, such as the manager.
- 3. Chapter 52: Wastewater: The chapter pertaining to Wastewater includes specific amounts for deposits (52.16), reconnections (52.20(E)), minimum monthly charges, excess charges, out-of-town rates, and taps (Appendix A: Sewer Charges). To make future adjustment of these amounts simpler, it is recommended that all amounts be removed from the ordinance and replaced a reference to the Town's schedule of rates and fees. If this approach is taken, an updated schedule of rates and fees would need to be adopted incorporating these amounts.

4. Chapter 93: Nuisances:

- A. §93.01: Add subsection (G) Nuisance trees. For purposes of this section, a nuisance tree is defined as:
 - (1) any dead, diseased or damaged trees or plant materials which may harbor serious insect or pests or disease injurious to other trees or plants;
 - (2) any tree in such a state of deterioration that any part of the tree is likely to fall and damage property or cause injury to a person; or
 - (3) any trees or plants that have been allowed to grow in such a manner that they block public sidewalks or other types of right of way or impede pedestrian or vehicle traffic or make travel on sidewalks or roadways unsafe.
- B. **§93.03:** Change "Town Clerk" to "Town Manager or his/her designee".

 Change "15 days" to "7 days".
- C. §93.04: Change "Town Clerk" to "Town Manager or his/her designee".
 Change "15 days" to "7 days".
- Criminal Penalty Opt-out To ensure that the Town can retain civil fines collected for ordinance violations, criminal penalty provisions must be removed. The following amendment of 10.99 would satisfy that need for most of the Town's ordinances:

§10.99: Amend as follows:

Whenever in this code any act is prohibited or is made or declared to be unlawful or an offense and where no specific penalty is provided therefore, the violation of such provision shall be punishable a fine not exceeding Five Hundred (\$500.00) Dollars. Each day that the violation of this Code or of any ordinance shall continue shall constitute a separate offense. Such penalties are to be recovered by the town in a civil action in the nature of debt if the offender does not pay the penalty within a prescribed period of time after he or she has been cited for violation of the ordinance.

The criminal penalty provisions set forth in North Carolina General Statute 14-4 shall not apply or be available for enforcement by the Town except where specifically stated within this Code.

Notwithstanding the above penalties, the town may enforce its lawful ordinances by appropriate equitable remedy issuing from a court of competent jurisdiction, including but not limited to injunction and/or abatement or by any remedy authorized by NCGS 160A-175 and 160A-389.

The following are other specific penalty sections within the Code of Ordinances along with a recommendation of whether or not to remove the criminal penalty. In some instances, it may be preferable to impose a criminal sanction.

§93.07: Nuisances - remove criminal penalty

§93.20: Nuisance parties - do not remove criminal penalty

§93.99: (B)(3) Penalty- limit to 93.08-09

(C)(3): do not remove criminal penalty

(E): do not remove criminal penalty

§133.99: do not remove criminal penalty

§150.37: Abandoned Structures - remove criminal penalty

 - 1. Special Use Request: Section 6.07C(a) Carolina Poultry 310 Kingold Make Recommendation to Board of Adjustment to Approve (with or without conditions) or Deny

Hill briefed the board on the request which is to build and operate a facility containing a boiler that will burn a mixture of turkey litter and wood shavings to create steam for Yamco and electricity for Duke Progress. Hill introduced Rich Denning, Sam McLamm, Frank Seymore, and Bailey Suggs representing Carolina Poultry Power and turned the floor over to them for a presentation (attached). They provided a sample of the fuel product in an unprocessed form to show that no smell is emitted.

The following were responses based on Board members questions:

- The lot will be leased to CPP by Yamco
- Surrounding property values should not be affected
- Heat from boiler creates steam for power
- 27 similar existing boilers in NC and SC with different fuel sources
- Ash waste goes to the fertilizer industry

- Ten truck per week will deliver fuel source- 1.5 trucks will leave with ash
- Will be required to meet all NC and Federal air quality regulations
- No mercury or arsenic is present
- Guarantee no odor- tucks are covered and building will maintain negative air pressure
- Material will be stored dry off site
- Local economy will be boosted through construction and installation, operations, and increased property tax value
- Certified staff will remain on site at all times
- This would replace existing natural gas boilers in use currently at Yamco

At this time, Chairman Beaman opened the floor for public comments and questions

- Concern was expressed that no other facility was in operation with a proven record of no negative effects
- Concern about what would happen to the facility if Yamco goes out of business: the facility would be dis-assembled and relocated
- Mr. Perry Jones read a statement from the Greene County NAACP with concerns about the project
- Representatives explained that the emissions would be heavily regulated by EPA and would be cleaner than burning 1/4 of a cord of firewood
- Applicant assured the group that there would be no expansion on the site
- Mr. Gene Riddle pointed out the emissions would likely be cleaner than what is produced by daily traffic
- An Environmental study will be conducted as part of the permitting process

Mr. Pridgen reviewed the process for approval whereby the Planning Board hears the request, allows for open dialogue with the public, and then forwards a recommendation to the Board of Adjustment. The BoA conducts a quasi-judicial hearing in which parties are allowed to deliver sworn testimony based on evidence and a decision is reached based on findings of fact outlined in the Snow Hill Zoning Ordinance.

Motion by Tinoco to recommend approval to the BoA with the condition that the applicant submits regular air quality sample results to a third party engineer for town review. Second by Davenport, Carried
